

Mr. Gravelle,

This letter is in regards to your response to Mr. Siegel, who had written about his group's poster in www.hellskitchen.org/gdt/pdf/Volume27/01.Strep.pdf. Though there are a few things I would comment upon if space permitted, there is one statement you made which has compelled me to respond. Your declaration that, "when traditionally a rapist is 5'10", 185lbs, dark-skinned, and wearing a FUBU jacket, then if a 5'10", 185lbs, dark-skinned, FUBU-sporting man is approaching a police officer" is "both blatantly racist and incredibly stupid," is false. It is neither blatantly racist, nor is it incredibly stupid.

Racism, properly defined, refers to idea that a certain race is superior to another, simply by nature, whether through genetics or another factor. Racism has existed in many forms through history, on the part of every major ethnic group, whether as white superiority during slavery; black superiority through the proposed benefits of melanin; Japanese or Chinese superiority over Europeans, or a litany of other examples. To make a claim such as yours does two things. First, it helps to foster an understanding of racism by the public that is simply incorrect. Second, it diminishes the horrific nature of true racism, which had manifested itself most obviously during World War II.

If you would like to continue defining "racism" more broadly, as I am sure many readers will be inclined to do, your statement still warrants a response. Racial profiling does not represent any kind of racism; it is a legitimate tool that can and should be used by law enforcement officials. If, in a certain area, "dark-skinned" men commit 80% of

all cases of rape, it is therefore not racist to make the claim that a "dark-skinned" man most likely committed the crime. Instead, it represents an objective fact. It is a legitimate piece of information that can be used by police in order to find the criminal. In a world where all resources are limited, including the police and the tools at their disposal, it makes no sense to discount the fact that the rapist in question is most likely dark skinned. While it obviously would be incorrect to simply arrest every dark-skinned man in the neighborhood, more attention should indeed be paid to that particular group of individuals. To do otherwise would be a great injustice to the residents of the area. The fact that you have given such a specific description of the person --- including things such as his weight, height, and jacket, as well as his race --- makes using race that much more permissible because it is no longer the only piece of information.

If a girl is walking alone in such an area and finds a group of "dark-skinned" men walking behind her, does it make her a racist if she begins to feel frightened? Obviously the answer is no. Should she not try to find somewhere populated in order to protect herself, simply because doing so would employ the knowledge that the men behind her are dark-skinned? Of course not. Jesse Jackson himself famously commented in 1993, "There is nothing more painful to me at this stage in my life than to walk down the street and hear footsteps and start thinking about robbery, then look around and see somebody white and feel relieved."

I find no difference between the statements made by Mr. Siegel and yourself. While it is clearly true that most Muslim men are not terrorists, it is also true that most terrorist attacks committed against the United States and her allies were (and are) committed by Muslim men. Though this statement is clearly not PC, it is something that can be objectively proven true or false. In fact, it is true, and the application of this information would include such things

as screening a disproportionately larger number of Arab men at airports and at other localities such as bridges and buildings. It would also, in the case mentioned by Mr. Siegel, mean stopping the man at security gate. Again, this does not include simply going and rounding up all such persons, but it is one of many pieces of evidence that can be used to fight crime and terrorism. It is plainly obvious that the United States is under attack from Islamic fundamentalists, and therefore it makes no sense to screen the elderly Catholic nun when she is boarding the airplane. Furthermore, because of the intense opposition to properly acknowledging who poses the threat to us --- Islamists -

-- the United States places herself in a dangerously precarious position, moral as well as physical.

I hope that this letter has the opportunity to be published in order for more light to be shed on the issue at hand. Thank you for your time in reading this, and I thank you in advance for your response.

Andrew,

Let me begin by thanking you for your letter, and apologizing for not actually being Peter C. Gravelle. My co-editor moved the his worldly possessions down state this weekend and is currently unconscious and is therefore unable to respond to your letter. I assure you, I write this with his utter confidence.

Let me continue by quoting the American Heritage Dictionary:

racism n.

1. The belief that race accounts for differences in human character or ability and that a particular race is superior to others.
2. Discrimination or prejudice based on race.

It would seem that Gravelle and yourself are both correct in your understanding of what is "racist". It is also apparent that "racism" is a somewhat novel concept.

If eighty percent of all rapes are perpetrated by people of a particular skin tone it is still counterproductive to classify all people of that description as likely rapists, because to do so is to presume some amount of guilt can be attributed to that sort person --- before they even commit a crime. Assuming that its citizens are guilty of a crime before they have been convicted is not something free societies do. However, if we assume that we are not in

a free society, and instead one that is governed solely by resources, as you suggest, it is still less that useful to presume the guilt of certain groups of people.

If a rape is committed, and it is immediately assumed that a black men committed the crime, time will be wasted looking for a black if a white man committed the crime. Moreover, statistics such as the above don't necessarily scale. If eighty percent of rapists are of a particular skin tone, it could still be that ninety-nine percent of people of that skin tone are not rapists, or even criminals.

As for the reverend Jackson, I have two things to say. The first is this: Jesse Jackson also said "Capital punishment turns the state into a murder. But imprisonment turns the state into a gay dungeon-master." And second, can you really be sure that Jackson meant "somebody white", and not "somebody white with a polo shirt, Armani slacks, leather business loafers"? How frightening do you think your hypothetical girl-walking-alone would find a clean-shaven black man in a good fitting, pinstripe suit? What about a young white man wearing pants several sizes too big for him and a wallet chain?

Profiling terrorists is similarly futile. Sharon and his police forces quickly found that the people blowing up their buses and cafes where Palestinian men. Terrorist organizations in Palestine have since created battalions of female suicide bombers. No amount of profiling will help stop an enemy with a changing face.

Now it's time to score yourself and find out how you rate. Remember, each question you answered A is a point, and this is very much like golf: a lower score can only be good.




Challenge




